COLORADO MINERAL SOCIETY (CMS) was founded in 1936 by a group of distinguished individuals within the mineralogical field. The organization was incorporated as a non-profit, educational organization in 1948. The Society is affiliated with the Colorado Federation of Gem and Mineral Societies, Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies, and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, a founding member of each group. **PURPOSE:** To promote the study of minerals and other geologic materials, to encourage mineral collecting as a hobby and to conduct public meetings, lectures, and field trips, and to engage in all activities which relate to said purposes of the organization.



MEETINGS: General membership meetings start at 7:30 PM on the first Friday of each month, October through May, at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, at 10th and Garrison in Lakewood, CO. Displays are set up by members about one-half hour before meetings. Specimens may be available for sale and trade. **VISITORS** and **GUESTS** are welcome. **BOARD MEETINGS:** The board members meet once a month to complete the executive business and affairs of the Society. Meetings will start at 7:00 PM usually the third Tuesday of each month. Additional meeting times, if necessary, may be called by the President or any three members of the board and will be announced at the general or board meetings.

MEMBERSHIP: Open to all persons who agree to abide by Society rules and rules of the Federations. Annual fees: \$16.00 for a Family or Newsletter Membership, \$14.00 for a Single Membership, \$12.00 for a Senior Membership (single or family over 65), and \$12.00 for junior members under the age of 18 who are not included in a family. Name badges are available for a one-time fee of \$5.00. **ANNUAL EVENTS:** Yearly activities include a silent auction of minerals, fossils, gems, jewelry, equipment and other items related to our interests; participation in the Colorado Contin-tail the largest mineral swap show in Colorado; participation as a member of the Greater Denver Area Gem and Mineral Council in sponsoring the largest gem and mineral show in Colorado; and the Founder's Day dinner.

FIELD TRIPS: The Society sponsors several field trips from Spring through Fall for the purpose of collecting minerals, crystals, and fossils. These trips are one-day, two-day, and occasionally several-day adventures. A field trip guide is published each year in May.

MINERAL MINUTES is the official publication of the COLORADO MINERAL SOCIETY and is published monthly October through May with special editions as needed. 
Movie Night

CSM (Colorado School of Mines) Geology Museum Musings

Activity in our Geology Museum continues at a rapid pace. My fifth year at the helm of the Museum has seen more change and improvements. I'm proud to announce that we were recently selected by Tripadvisor.com as the #2 ranked tourist attraction in Golden, in terms of visitor satisfaction, out of 28 Golden attractions, and were awarded their Certificate of Excellence. This resulted from the help of our Advisory Council, Student Aides, staff, FCSMGM, donors, volunteers, specimen loaners, visitors, visiting researchers, CSM faculty, administrators, and students who support us in so many ways. Our 2012 Gift Shop sales were up 42% and our donations box was down 1%. Our facebook fans increased by 36%.

Here is the year in review. Our Advisory Council has met monthly. Among other things, we ratified an optical instruments protocol. Continuing projects include improving our database and cataloguing many new donations in two warehouses.

I have met monthly with our twelve Student Aides. Nine Aides are currently geology majors, and five are women! I've written many graduate school recommendation letters this past year for those who have graduated from our program.



I held weekly meetings with our Collections managers and volunteers. These are the folks who maintain our collection, prepare new displays, and keep our Gift Shop well stocked. Our volunteer ranks have now risen to roughly 55. They created a marvelous display for the Denver Mineral Show last September. As far as I know, this was the first time that a group of museum volunteers has erected a display of their own collections in a major mineral show in North America.

We reprinted 20,000 museum brochures through the generosity of Jane and Marshall C. Crouch III. We are also grateful to have received grants from the Golden Civic Foundation and the Greater Denver Area Gem and Mineral Council.

The Friends of the CSM Geology Museum now has over 120 members from around the world, an increase of 52%. They have generously provided several stunning pieces for our collection and became members of the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineral Societies. The Friends have ratified their new logo, are currently reviewing their by-laws, and are investigating becoming recognized as a 501c(3) organization. During the past year, they ran very popular field trips to the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto, Marty Zinn's mineral collection, the Henderson Mine, North Table Mountain, Lake City, the Picketwire Canyon dinosaur trackway, and two trips near Socorro, NM in conjunction with the New Mexico Minerals Symposium. Other 2012 events deserving mention included processing numerous donations, identifying many specimens, and securing many impressive loans. Our fifth Museum Book Sale combined with our Garage Sale last February was very well attended. We held a sealed bid auction of 13 high-end specimens that was a mild success. Our geology trail continues to be enjoyed by our guests. We received full ownership of over 8000 specimens given to us in 1965 by the Colorado State Historical Society. A team of CSM students did a fine job installing new digital controls for our UV display and a remote control device for our tour guides to use. Five of our staff graduated in May, which created many staffing challenges, but some really great rookies have done a fine job as their replacements. I gave a paper in August in Dresden, Germany at an international conference for mineral museum curators, about the people that help run our Museum, which was well received.

Our Annual Open House last September was an overwhelming success. Over 283 guests enjoyed our refreshments, music from the CSM string quartet, and our ten new and three updated exhibits. We are innovatively using a new generation of LEDs in six exhibits. The ten new exhibits include: Vasily Konovalenko's gem carving entitled "Gold Prospectors" on loan from the Denver Museum of Nature and Science, Mexican minerals from Kerith Graeber, Arizona minerals from Les Presmyk, American turquoise from John Haney, Copper minerals from Marty Zinn, Elmwood Mine specimens from Stephen Neely, Chinese snuff bottles from an anonymous collector, Petrified wood

identified by species from Melvin and Bertina Lentz, Self-collected specimens from one of our Collections Managers named Tom Hughes, and Colorado barite specimens from many local collectors. Our three updated exhibits involve fossils, micromounts, and mining artifacts. In late September, I gave two lectures at the Baltimore Micromount Symposium. Our Garage Sale last November 3rd was very popular.

As for upcoming events, we look forward to another combined book and garage sale from February 18-22 in the large Conference Room across the hall from our Museum entrance. Prices will decrease on most items every day of that week. Please see the flyer elsewhere in this newsletter. (We gladly accept your book, journal, and specimen donations throughout the year). Second, our Annual Open House is scheduled for September 11, 2013 from 6 to 9 P.M.

Finally, come visit our Museum during our normal hours: Monday – Saturday 9 A.M. to 4 P.M., Sundays 1 P.M. – 4 P.M., except for certain legal and school holidays. Admission to our Museum is free (donations are greatly appreciated), but parking fees are required in our lots and on campus streets Mondays through Fridays before 5 P.M. Further information is available on our website, or by phone.

The Colorado School of Mines (CSM) Geology Museum will host a used book sale February 18-22 from 9-4 daily. These are the same days and hours as the CSM library book sale. Similarly, <u>most</u> prices will decrease about 50% each day. **Our Museum book sale will be in the Museum building, in the room across the hall from the Museum entrance.**

We have sorted through dozens of boxes of books, several hundred maps, and several hundred U.S.G.S. folios. **There's a wide range of interesting publications for rock hobbyists, as well as explorationists.** The Museum address is 1310 Maple Street in Golden and our phone number is 303-273-3815. We accept cash, checks, and credit cards. Members of the "Friends of the CSM Geology Museum" receive a 20% discount on all their purchases.

Remember that there is a small fee for parking in campus lots and on campus streets. Please make sure to pay for a parking permit from one of the parking kiosks and place the permit on your dashboard, to avoid being ticketed.

Greater Denver Area Gem & Mineral Council 2012 Approved Grant Requests

The Council receives, evaluates and approves grant requests twice each year in March and September. This report is being sent to all eight clubs that are members of the Greater Denver Area Gem & Mineral Council to be published in their newsletter.

- 1. Friends of Dinosaur Ridge received \$4,500.00 for two different projects:
 - a. \$500.00 to help defray the costs for Dinosaur Discovery Day.
 - b. \$4,000.00 for video equipment and associated expenses for an Arthur Lakes video they were producing.
- 2. The Bessemer Historical Society received \$1,000.00 for supplies to store the rock and mineral specimens they have collected from the CF&I.
- 3. The Observant Naturalist received \$2,700.00 for rocks, supplies and other costs to produce a Teachers' Rock Program.
- 4. The Morrison Natural History Museum received \$500.00 to pay for stylus replacements for the tools they use to extract fossils from hard rock.
- 5. The Western Interior Paleontological Society received \$3,000.00 for publicity materials for their 2013 symposium.
- 6. The Denver Museum of Nature and Science received \$5,649.75 for a SPOT Insight Mosaic 4 Megapixel microscope camera and control software.

The total amount of grant money paid to these organizations in 2012 was **\$17,349.75.**

Each of the eight clubs can receive a \$250.00 grant from the Council to help defray their newsletter expenses. Each club must have a representative attend all four Council meetings each year. Seven clubs met this requirement in 2012. They will receive their grant money after the March 2013 Council meeting. The Grant money comes from the proceeds of the 2012 Greater Area Gem and Mineral show. Grant information and the application form is available at: denvermineralshow.com



Crystallography 101

All minerals fall within one of the crystal systems depicted below. This month we will examine some of the properties of the Isometric System.



THE ISOMETRIC SYSTEM


The crystals of all of the classes of the Isometric System are referenced by three axes of equal length that are at right angles to each other. As the axes are identical, they are interchangeable, and are all designated by the letter a. When properly oriented, one axis a_1 , is horizontal and oriented from front to back, a_2 is horizontal and oriented from right to left, and a_3 is oriented vertically; with all three axes having positive and negative designations respective of the aforementioned orientations.

Crystals of the Isometric System possess various elements of symmetry, these elements are: the center of rotation, various axes of rotation, and various mirror planes. In Colorado, the most familiar minerals that we see in the Isometric System are Pyrite, Galena, Fluorite, and Garnet.



Pyrite is in the Diploidal class and has a center of symmetry (*C*), the three crystallographic axes are axes of two fold symmetry ($3A_2$), the four diagonal axes are axes of three fold symmetry ($4A_3$), and the three crystallographic axes are planes of mirror symmetry (3P). The most common forms encountered in Pyrite are the cube, the pyritohedron, and the octahedron (see figures on the next page).

Galena, Fluorite, and Garnet are in the Hexoctahedral Class. Minerals in the Hexoctahedral Class have a center of symmetry (C), the three crystallographic axes are axes of four fold symmetry ($3A_4$), the four diagonal axes are axes of three fold symmetry ($4A_3$), there are six diagonal axes of symmetry ($6A_2$) and there are nine planes of mirror symmetry that correspond to the three crystallographic axes and to the six planes that bisect the angle between any two axial planes (9P). Galena most commonly exhibits the form of the cube and the octahedron. The forms found in Fluorite most often are the cube and penetration twins composed of multiple cubes, and forms that appear to be octahedral are due to Fluorite having perfect octahedral cleavage. Garnet most commonly has the form of a dodecahedron and sometimes the form of the trapezohedron, often in combination thereof. (2)
