### **Identifying Minerals** by John Betts, New York, NY

The process of identifying minerals is like looking up the spelling of a word in a dictionary: You have to know the spelling in advance to find the word in the dictionary!

Books and web sites are full of facts about mineral species. But they are organized by mineral species, not by the attributes that we can observe.

What is needed is a process derived from the wisdom and knowledge of practical experience. This lecture will focus on three essential reference books, techniques to narrow the possibilities when looking up references, and how to approach identifying unknown minerals. It will include some simple tests, using everyday items, which you can perform quickly in your home.

Building on Mark Jacobson's previous lecture in December 2020, How to Identify Colorado Minerals, Mr. Betts addresses identifying minerals from any source. You may not be able to identify every mineral after this lecture, but the possibilities will be greatly narrowed to a few likely suspects.

#### About the Presenter:



**John Betts** was born in Illinois in 1956 in a family full of artists and attended the University of Illinois receiving a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Industrial Design in 1978. Mr. Betts started collecting minerals in 1969 while living in California. His interest in minerals was heightened during summer vacation in Maine where he heard the famous mineral dealer/collector Stan Perham lecture about the huge beryl crystals discovered at the Bumpus Quarry in Maine. John has collected Maine minerals along with other New England states ever since.

His skills as a prolific field collector led to modest mineral sales at local mineral shows in the New York City area. By 1990 he was selling at 12 mineral shows per year. In 1996 Mr. Betts started an internet web site selling minerals johnbetts-fineminerals.com which rapidly expanded to the point that it was a second full time job. In 2001, after 23 years of working as a product designer, Mr. Betts left design work to devote his full energy to selling minerals. To date he has sold over 75,000 mineral specimens.

### In Memorium - Robert "Bob" Aussprung

Robert Aussprung, age 91, of Mesa, Arizona, passed away peacefully due to complications from pneumonia, on December 19, 2020.

Bob was born on September 9, 1929, in Joliet. He graduated with his bachelor's and master's degrees in Education from Illinois State University. He is survived by his wife Betty; daughter, Sherry (Steve); son, Robert; and granddaughter, Alexandra.

He was most proud of all the students he taught and coached in the Peotone 207-U school district in a Chicago suburb throughout the years. Bob started teaching at Peotone High School in 1957, where he taught Science and Drivers Education, coached numerous sports, and was Athletic Director.

He was most happy when he was on the golf course, fishing, traveling, or faceting stones. Bob

played his last game of golf four weeks before his passing. Bob was a CMS Life Member and joined the club in 1988. He led numerous rock hunting trips in Arizona, Colorado, and Arkansas. His daughter Sherry wrote to me that Bob was very proud to be a CMS member and she wanted to thank us for allowing him to lead field trips, talk "rock" as he said, and to be among like people who truly saw the value in rock education. Per Sherry, Bob's love for stones was amazing. He would try to cut anything and loved the challenge. She found an unfinished garnet on his machine he was trying to cut. On a side note, Sherry said her dad also loved making ceramic steins. So for his cremation urn, they used one of the steins and sealed the top with a beautiful slab of agate that he had found years ago.

A memorial service is pending due to Covid-19 protocols and he will be buried in Fort Logan Cemetery in Colorado. Donations can be made to the American Cancer Society or First Tee.

### In Memorium - Jordan Sawdo

Jordan K. Sawdo, a CMS Life Member, peacefully passed in his home with his children by his side on November 12, 2020. Jordon joined CMS in February 1967 after giving a talk to the club on Fossils.

Jordan was born on February 13, 1932 in Denver to John K. Sawdo and Mary Dorak. Living together with his father and grandmother, who only spoke Czechloslovakian, provided a memorable old world experience. They lived in rural Denver with kerosene lamps and an outside privy, raising pigs, growing what little food they had, and looked forward to the occasional trips to Denver to the Goodwill for a pair of "new" shoes. In fact, it wasn't until second grade that he had electricity and running water. His childhood was full of memories that were character building, clearly demonstrating his tenacity, love, and resilience in life.



Jordan attended West High and was in the graduating class of 1950. It is there that he met his sweetheart, Ruth G. Sausaman and they were married on September 28, 1952. Jordan and Ruth shared 65 amazing years together, before her passing in 2017. Their life together began with Jordan's military experience in the Navy Reserve and US Air Force, and then on to graduate school where he went to class by day and worked by night as a janitor and setting pins by hand at the local bowling alley to provide for his family of 3 children at that time.

After graduating Magna Cum Laude from the University of Colorado in 1958, he went to work for General Mills for over a decade, and another decade with National Tea Company where he was eventually the Director of Operations for over 44 stores statewide. Finally, after devoting many years in the grocery business, he had the opportunity to work in the field of geology. This led to directional drilling and subsurface surveying and he became the District Manager for Wilson Downhole, overseeing Colorado, Wyoming, Utah, North and South Dakota. Jordan was so well known and respected in the field, he went on to start his own company, which also allowed him to teach courses in Petroleum Technology, as well as designing oil wells for major oil companies. He never missed an opportunity to teach and did so at various colleges and universities, including the University of Colorado (Denver), Colorado School of Mines for many years, an extension course for the University of Texas, and a guest faculty member at Adelaide University in Australia, while he and Ruth were on a teaching exchange.

Additional lifetime teaching experiences ranged from his dedicated work of teaching from his basement at night, to a decade of fossil and related geology classes at the Denver Museum of Nature and Science. Furthermore, Jordan selflessly created courses for anyone who requested them, including school groups, where he and Ruth spent hours volunteering their time to devote to education of the youth. Jordan also provided displays, and unique specimens to many museums, including the Denver Museum of Nature and Science, Adams County Museum, and the Smithsonian Museum, where the fossil named after him, ERETMOCRINUS sawdoi, is currently housed.

He excelled to unimaginable heights in this field becoming a nationally recognized appraiser in paleontology for museums, courts, as well as private collections. He held offices in many local organizations including Flatirons Mineral Club, Colorado Mineral Society, North Jeffco Mineral Society, and Rocky Mountain Mineral Society, to publishing and co-authoring many books, to being the founder of the Western Interior Paleontological Society (WIPS), where he leaves behind many friends and an immense legacy of love and dedication.

A celebration of life may be considered when it is safe to gather again. The family would like contributions to go to Western Interior Paleontological Society for educational grants and scholarships in his honor.

**COLORADO MINERAL SOCIETY (CMS)** was founded in 1936 by a group of distinguished individuals within the mineralogical field. The organization was incorporated as a non-profit, educational organization in 1948. The Society is affiliated with the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, a founding member of each group.

**PURPOSE:** To promote the study of minerals and other geologic materials, to encourage mineral collecting as a hobby and to conduct public meetings, lectures, and field trips, and to engage in all activities which relate to said purposes of the organization.

**MEETINGS:** General membership meetings usually start at 7:30 PM on the first Friday of each month, October through May. During COVID, all meetings are held virtually online.

**BOARD MEETINGS:** The board members meet once a month to complete the executive business and affairs of the Society. Meetings will start at 7:00 PM usually the third Tuesday of each month.

**MEMBERSHIP:** Open to all persons who agree to abide by Society rules and rules of the Federations. Annual fees are: \$20.00 for a Family living at the same household, \$18.00 for a Single Membership, \$15.00 for a Senior Membership (single or family over 65), and \$15.00 for junior members under the age of 18 who are not included in a family. Name badges are available for a one-time fee of \$7.50.

**ANNUAL EVENTS:** Yearly activities include a silent auction of minerals, fossils, gems, jewelry, equipment and other items related to our interests; participation as a member of the Denver Greater Gem and Mineral Council and the original Denver Gem and Mineral Show; and the Founder's Day celebration.
