Post-Denver Show Geologic Excursion to Oregon

A day after the Denver show, Zelda and I packed the suitcases and rockhounding gear and headed for Oregon to visit our daughter. We planned to take 3 days to drive there, so that we could stop and look for specimens along the way. Our first stop was at Yellowcat, about 30 miles into Utah. There were plenty of nice agates and jasper to find there, in all shapes, sizes, and colors. We also came across a lot of petrified wood. The wood had some good structure, and appeared to be weathering from small stumps. In an hour we collected 3 bags of material. Note that this site was listed in 2 different guidebooks, both with the wrong exit number from I-70 listed. The actual exit number is 193, not 190 or 191.

On our way to our first night stop in Delta, Utah, we made a quick stop in Green River to buy fresh melons. There's a stand (Vetere Farms) at a truck stop at the second Green River exit off of I-70. The melons are always great, and the people who work at the stand can tell you which ones are ripe now, and which ones need a few days more.


The next morning, we headed to the U-Dig Fossils trilobite site, about 50 miles west and north of Delta. The site is owned by the Bug House, who usually set up at the Stock Show complex during the Denver Show. They charge a fee to dig there, and the rate depends on how long you dig. We paid \$28 each for 2 hours, and for the fee they will provide hammers and buckets and show you the most productive places to dig. You're guaranteed to find trilobites, even in a short time. We filled up a bucket with specimens of various sizes and quality. They've also got toilets and picnic tables at the site. We left there a bit after noon, for the long drive to Reno for our second night.

Our next stop on the drive was Lassen Volcanic National Park. It's a relatively small park, but it has great scenery and geothermal features - sort of like a mini Yellowstone. Mt. Lassen last erupted about a hundred years ago, in 1915. It was interesting to see how much the land had and had not recovered in that time. Lassen Peak is one of the world's largest plug volcanoes, and it rises 2000 feet above the surrounding landscape. They've got a great visitors' center, and lots of hiking trails. Unfortunately, we couldn't take in all that there is to see there, so we mostly did a drive through of the park with several stops along the way, before heading up to Oregon that night.

While in Oregon, we spent a weekend along the beautiful southern coast, where we searched for agates on the beaches (without much luck). We returned to the Crater Rock museum in Central Point, which I wrote about last year, and enjoyed seeing their world class specimens. Besides specimens for sale in the gift shop, they have piles of cutting material and petrified wood that is for sale by the pound behind the museum. We also spent time visiting vineyards and picking blackberries to make preserves, and took a tour of the Harry and David factory and packing plant.

Colorado Mineral Society Historical Facts

It all started on September 24, 1936 when seven mineral enthusiasts met in Chester Howard's Apartment in Denver. The mission was to promote the study of minerals and other geologic materials, to encourage mineral collecting as a hobby and to conduct public meetings, lectures and field trips.

The first regular meeting was October 9, 1936 with 14 founding members from four cities. A Constitution and by-laws were adopted.

By June 1937, there were 83 members and by June 1938, there were 123 members. Membership peaked in 1948 with over 500 members. Currently we have over 265 members.

Annual dues in 1936 were \$0.50. They are now \$16.00 for a family.

Starting with the October 1936 meeting, regular meetings have always been on the first Friday of each month from October through May at 7:30 PM. That tradition continues today.

The first silent auction was started January 5, 1951, which received \$109.25. It has been continued annually since.

CMS sponsored the first annual Denver Gem and Mineral Fair in August 1960 at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds (the forerunner to today's Denver Gem and Mineral Show.) Over 200 people attended during the two-day run. Approximately 100 displays and ten dealer booths were at the show.

The first field trip program began in the summer of 1937 with an open house at the Howard Ranch.

In the summer of 1938, the Colorado Mineral Society embarked on an ambitious project of establishing and maintaining a 5-week field-collecting base camp at an elevation of 12,000 feet on Mt. Antero.

Pack horses hauled in four tents, food, and digging equipment for the base camp, which was located on the east side of the canyon between Mount Antero and White Mountain. They built a supply house and hand-built the equipment.

Jerome Hurianek was in charge of the camp and president Howard carried food and supplies. People staved for a few days to two weeks.

Thanks go to Bob Burroughs, John Kleber, and Kuyper Reynolds for helping with the raffle.




