Directions:

The most direct route to Mount Vernon Country Club is to take I-70 West (into the foothills) to Exit 254, the Genesee Park Exit. At the top of the exit ramp is a stop sign, turn right at that stop sign. You are now going North on MVCC Road. Continue North through the MVCC Gate and follow the paved road for approximately 1.3 miles - the Club is on the left. If you are coming East on I-70 (from Evergreen, Idaho Springs, etc.), turn left at the stop sign at the top of the Genesee Exit Ramp. Go back over the highway, continue North through the MVCC Gate and follow the paved road approximately 1.3 miles - the Club is on the left.

ALTERNATE DIRECTIONS to Mount Vernon Country Club:

1. From Exit 256, Lookout Mtn. Road - turn right at the stop sign at the top of the exit ramp. At the mountain, dead end, turn left. You are now on US-40 going west, continue west to Lookout Mtn. Road. Turn right (North) onto Lookout Mtn. Road; on the left where the road begins to curve, you will see the MVCC arches. Turn left under the arches, you are now on MVCC Road, follow the paved road for approximately 1 mile - the club is on the right.

2011 Denver Show Report

The Colorado Mineral Society was very well represented at the 2011 Denver Gem and Mineral Show held September 16-18, 2011 at the Denver Merchandise Mart. Below is a summary of the highlights involving CMS displays and competitive entries. However, first I'd like to recognize the outstanding job done by Debbie Kalscheur, Amber Brenzikofer, Bruce Sales, Steve Major, Eva, Jeff Self, and Donna Ware (with

some help from me) in pulling together the two display cases commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the CMS. The first of these cases (Photo 1) contained memorabilia involving CMS founding members Chester Howard (our first president) and Richard Pearl, (our first treasurer) who was a noted mineralogist and author. The case also featured a CMS trophy cup that was awarded to the member judged to have collected the best specimen during a given field season. The case also contained the 75th Anniversary specimen selected by CMS members at the Founders Day picnic, a superb Mt. Antero Aquamarine collected by past CMS President Dayton Mong. The case also contained a choice amazonite also collected by Dayton, a unique beryl specimen collected by Louise Sundholm (Eric Hedrick's mother) on Mt Antero in 1949, an agate knife collected by Dayton Mong's wife Barbara in Utah, and some Fairburn Agates collected by Chester Howard in the 1950's.




Photo 1: CMS 75th Anniversary display case on the main floor of the Denver

The second 75th Anniversary Case was displayed on the CMS club table (Photo 2). It emphasized CMS's long tradition of supporting earth science education through our support of the Colorado Science Fair and the large number of field trips conducted by CMS over the years. The case featured a number of fine specimens collected by CMS members over the years including: two superb phenakites on matrix from Mt Antero collected by Dayton Mong, an amazonite and cleavlandite specimen also collected by Dayton Mong, a superb gahnite specimen from the Cotapaxi Mine collected by Nels Grevstad, smoky quartz specimens collected by Steve Major and John Rowe, and a Mt Antero fluorite and Stoneham barite I collected in 2008 and 2009, respectively. All these specimens were selected by CMS members at the Founder's Day picnic for inclusion in the 75th Anniversary Display cases.

Note that Bruce Sales built the fine hardwood risers and liners as well as a number of the wood specimen mounts we used to display the specimens. Steve Major and his son Hunter did a great job covering the case liners and Debbie Kalscheur and Amber Brenzikofer organized and developed the historical materials for the displays. Eva ordered the banners and Jeff and Donna helped with the display themes. Thanks also to Bill Hutchinson and Don Bray who loaned their old Denver show cases to the Display Committee so we could prep the displays ahead of the show and Sandra Gonzales who photographed all the 75th Anniversary specimens.

The CMS club table looked great as usual thanks to our Club Table Coordinator Gary Borkan. As in past years CMS gave out a large number of rock and mineral specimens to kids (and adults) at the show. Thanks to everyone who donated material and volunteered to man the table during the show. The club table also featured another great Lego mine display prepared by Kuyper and Rigel Reynolds which was a big hit with the kids and adults alike!

I am very pleased to report that CMS did quite well in the Prospector competitions this year with CMS taking first prize for the Club Prospector Competition (Photo 3). The Club Prospector case featured a superb smoky quartz, fluorite, feldspar combination piece collected by Ethan Steffen during the CMS field trip to Star and Julio Edwards claim at Crystal Peak (thanks Star and Julio!). The second featured specimen was a scaphites ammonite collected by Bruce Sales on the trip he led to the TXI quarry near Golden. The third featured specimen a fine specimen of goethite after pyrite in quartz collected by Nels Grevstad during the Missouri Hill trip. The case was rounded out with specimens collected by Mike and Jennifer Senary (Sedalia mine garnet, Red Feather Lakes amethyst), Nels Grevstad (Red Feather Lakes amethyst), James Pool (Tarryall topaz), and a large doubly terminated Mt Antero quartz crystal I collected this year. Bruce Sales accepted the Prospector trophy at the Saturday night awards ceremony. Thanks also to Donna Ware who came up with the simple but elegant design of using a set of mineral books to highlight our finds!

Richard also won a trophy for his Educational Display on pyrite in the Advanced Individual Competitive Case competition. Congratulations Richard!

Also winning in the Individual Competitive Case competition was Ethan Steffen who took first prize in the Open Division, Junior Class, for his collection of Viburnum Trend minerals from Missouri (Photo 5). And last but certainly not least, Shealeene Kent (Jeff Self's and Donna Ware's granddaughter) displayed her collection of Russian mineral specimens on the main floor (Photo 6). Great job CMS Juniors!


