COLORADO MINERAL SOCIETY (CMS) was founded in 1936 by a group of distinguished individuals within the mineralogical field. The organization was incorporated as a non-profit, educational organization in 1948. The Society is affiliated with the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies and the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, a founding member of each group.

PURPOSE: To promote the study of minerals and other geologic materials, to encourage mineral collecting as a hobby and to conduct public meetings, lectures, and field trips, and to engage in all activities which relate to said purposes of the organization.

MEETINGS: General membership meetings start at 7:30 PM on the first Friday of each month, October through May, at St. Paul's Episcopal Church, at 10th and Garrison in Lakewood, CO. Displays are set up by members about one-half hour before meetings. Specimens may be available for sale and trade. **VISITORS** and **GUESTS** are welcome.

BOARD MEETINGS: The board members meet once a month to complete the executive business and affairs of the Society. Meetings will start at 7:00 PM usually the third Tuesday of each month. Additional meeting times, if necessary, may be called by the President or any three members of the board and will be announced at the general or board meetings.

MEMBERSHIP: Open to all persons who agree to abide by Society rules and rules of the Federations. Annual fees: \$16.00 for a Family or Newsletter Membership, \$14.00 for a Single Membership, \$12.00 for a Senior Membership (single or family

over 65), and \$12.00 for junior members under the age of 18 who are not included in a family. Name badges are available for a one-time fee of \$7.50.

ANNUAL EVENTS: Yearly activities include a silent auction of minerals, fossils, gems, jewelry, equipment and other items related to our interests; participation as a member of the Denver Greater Gem and Mineral Council and the original Denver Gem and Mineral Show; and the Founder's Day celebration.

FIELD TRIPS: The Society sponsors several field trips from Spring through Fall for the purpose of collecting minerals, crystals, and fossils. These trips are one-day, two-day, and occasionally several-day adventures. A field trip guide is published each year in May.

NEWSLETTER GUIDELINES: CMS has a proud history of promoting the education and pure enjoyment of the mineralogical world. At the very heart of its existence are the many volunteers and contributors who spend their time and efforts in direct support of the club's mission. The CMS official newsletter **MINERAL MINUTES** is published monthly during the active meeting season (October through May) and a summer edition, and is the primary way the club's activities and mission are communicated to its members and prospective members. On that basis, the Board of Directors would like to offer the following content guidelines for CMS newsletter contributions:

- Formal announcements concerning club business and/or membership
- Information around mineral-related education opportunities or fundraising activities
- Stories or history that concentrate on the edifying aspects of mineral collection and education
- Sharing of personal mineral-related experience from field trips or other related adventures serving an educational purpose
- Announcements of volunteer/leadership opportunities for the club or club representation
- Worthy news events or discoveries related to mineralogy or geology that align to club's core interests
- Appropriate announcements regarding mineral shows, onetime mineral related events, mineral auctions, sale of private collections and/or equipment, etc.
- Information around relevant donations and/or gifts made available to the club or club members

In Tribute William "Bill" Harrison

December 30, 1952 ~ July 9, 2017 (age 64)

The Colorado Mineral Society (CMS) and rock club community recently lost a good friend. Bill Harrison past away suddenly from an infection on July 9, 2017 in Littleton, Colorado. Our hearts go out to his wife Cheryl and their family. Bill's memorial service will be:

William "Bill" Gordon Harrison, Jr. was born December 30, 1952 to William Jesse Harrison and Patricia Ann (Dillard) Harrison in Pueblo, Colorado. He married Cheryl (Schultz Krug) in 1976. Their children are Eric J. (& Debbie Arnet Sunde) Harrison, Sugar Hill, Georgia; CH (MAJ) William I. (& Rachel Liebsch) Harrison, Ft. Wainwright, Alaska; and Dustin L. (Margaret Wurzer) Harrison, Denver, Colorado. A teenage foster daughter, Jennifer (nee Wons-Glover (Greg Walker)), joined the family in the late 1980's. Bill loved and enjoyed his grandchildren Gabriella, Mikayla, and William (children of William and Rachel) and Jackson, Archie, Lucy, and Lane (children of Jennifer and Greg).

"Billy" began elementary school in Englewood, Colorado and Junior High in Northglenn, Colorado but graduated Senior High from Douglas County High School, Castle Rock, Colorado. As a student, he played football (#75), developed a passion for the sciences, played piano (Für Elise) and attained the 4-H W.H. Danforth I-Dare-You Award. He went on to attend Colorado School of Mines. While at the Colorado School of Mines, he was active in the Search & Rescue unit and ROTC.

During his 43-year career, he worked for Natkin Construction, Stearns-Roger, Stone & Webster, Raytheon, CH2M Hill, Washington Group International, URS, and Jacobs Engineering Group. His design capabilities were sought after for many civil, power, and mining projects in many parts of the world as well as Colorado.

Bill was enthusiastic about various hobbies. Early on he added CB radio (Lucky Miner) and 4-wheeling to his love of Search & Rescue. During high school, he became a "rockhound" and within a short while had involved his entire family in the Gates Rock and Mineral Club, joining in 1971. He loved Colorado's outdoors and field collecting was a passion.

William "Bill" Harrison (continued)

Bill served as Gate's President for a year or two and the field trip leader for many years. The Gates club disbanded in 2007. He was the Colorado Federation of Mineralogical Societies President in 1974 and the Rocky Mountain Federation of Mineralogical Societies (RMFMS) Rules Chairman for several years. One rock club wasn't enough and he joined Mile-High RAMs from 1973-1980. During the 1980's he changed his club affiliations to North Jeffco Gem and Mineral Club and joined CMS in 2006. He remained a member of both North Jeffco and CMS until his death. He loved rhodochrosite, wulfenite, stibnite, and tourmaline from anywhere. He loved collecting and missed it terribly over the last decade due to health reasons.

Bill also took an active part in the Denver Gem and Mineral Show (and its precursor), serving as Show Chairman in 1974 and 1988. In 1972, Bill was awarded the Gates-sponsored "Rockhound of the Year Award" at the Denver Show for all the critical Gates club positions he had held. He also the Special Activities Chairman in 1975 and then Bill and Cheryl were in charge of Signs in later years.


Bill enjoyed spending time with other mineral lovers and during retirement he volunteered weekly at Colorado School of Mines Geology Museum. Here is a statement from Bruce Geller, the Curator of the Geology Museum:

"Bill began volunteering at the CSM Geology Museum in March, 2016. He helped sort specimens, labelled them, and priced them for the Gift Shop. Bill also enjoyed organize materials for Garage Sales, especially books, and priced many of them. He loaned specimens for our Colorado calcite and Colorado quartz displays. Bill donated items to our Museum, attended our Open Houses, and enjoyed our volunteer potluck. We loved his subtle humor and wide grin. He will be missed."

According to Cheryl, the Church family at Columbine Baptist was near and dear to Bill's heart. Every club or activity that Bill joined was fundamentally about relationships with the people he met there. No matter what he was involved in or how you knew Bill, that he got along with you was more important to him than anything else.



He had a special love for Colorado, for its hard rock mines, especially those in Creede. He also loved Camp Bird and Black Cloud, the mines and miners as well as the minerals and ores. He had a pretty comprehensive knowledge of mining history and railroad history in the state too.


Railroading was always dear to Bill, but vision problems prevented him from following down his father's and grandfathers' tracks. Despite this disappointment, he cultivated a deep knowledge of Colorado railroading and Colorado history. An on-going N-Scale model railroad in the basement gave him a creative outlet following his first health crisis. He became known as a skilled model builder and loved the contributions he made to the N-Scale lay-out at the Forney Transportation Museum.





Mark Leatherman* won a specimen of fluorite and barite, from Cave-in-Rock, Hardin County, Illinois (\$76) which was donated from the **Charles Speltz Collection Minerals**. **BC Rocks & Minerals, Bill & Cheryl Harrison** donated a beautiful specimen of fluorapophyllite on stilbite from India (\$69). DENVER GEM AND MINERAL SHOW JOBS

We need help!! The following is a list of jobs that need volunteers. If you previously signed up to volunteer at a CMS meeting, those lists have been given to the chairpersons identified below. The chairperson or a representative should be contacting you to set up a schedule for working at the show. If you have not heard from them by the beginning of September, please contact them directly.

CLUB BOOTH: CMS will have a booth that requires at least 2 people to be present during show hours all three days. We give away tons of rocks and minerals to kids and adults, recruit new members, and answer questions. If you checked CMS booth on the volunteer list, we will be contacting you early September, as well as setting up times at the Founders Day picnic on September 9th.




