Sat.-Sun., Sep. 8-9, Workshop on Thin Sections of Meteorites

"Please allow me to introduce myself: my name is Anne Black, I am a meteorite dealer in Denver, and I have supplied the gift shop in the CSM Geology Museum for quite a while. One of my specialties is Thin-Sections of meteorites. I am planning a workshop strictly on those thin-sections. This workshop will be lead by Dr. Anthony Irving, one of the most respected meteoriticists and professor at the University of Washington in Seattle. It will be held in Boulder in one of the labs on the campus of the University of Colorado all day Saturday September 8 and about half a day on Sunday September 9, 2012. We obtained the use of that lab free of charge, and Dr. Irving is not asking for any fee. He only asks that we cover

Irving is not asking for any fee. He only asks that we cover his expenses (round trip air fare from Seattle, 2 nights hotel stay) and this will be divided equally among all the participants to the workshop. It is a private function, not covered in any way by the School of Mines, and open to anyone with an interest in meteorites and basic knowledge on how to use a petrographic microscope. Since I will have to limit the number of participants to no more than 15 persons, please let me know very soon if you are interested, and if you have any questions."

THE AURORA FOSSIL MUSEUM

No, it's not a new museum in the Denver area, but one in Aurora, North Carolina, about 130 miles southeast of Raleigh. Zelda and I spent a week near the North Carolina coast in mid-May and came across a flyer for the Aurora Fossil Museum and decided to check it out. We really hadn't been expecting to do anything rock-related on this trip, so this seemed like a good opportunity.

The Aurora Fossil Museum is a non-profit fossil-education resource center. The museum's mission is to increase knowledge of the geology and paleontology of the coastal plains of North Carolina through exhibits, outreach programs and field studies. The museum is relatively small, but it includes two different buildings. The main building has four rooms with exhibits and a gift shop. A second building serves as an educational center and meeting space, although it also has exhibits. The museum is mainly dedicated to fossils found in the area, but there are also mineral displays, fossils from other parts of the world, and a room dedicated to local Native American archeology.

So, you may ask, why is there a fossil museum in coastal North Carolina? It turns out that Aurora is home to a large phosphate quarry, the PCS mine. The phosphate beds are within the Miocene-age (15 million years old) Pungo River Formation, which contains abundant marine fossils, particularly shark teeth. According to the museum's web site, the mine has been called the most important source of Pliocene and Miocene fossils in the world.

During the late 1960's and early 1970's, Peter Harmatuk, an amateur paleontologist, began to collect vertebrate fossils at the former Texasgulf Sulfur Mine in Aurora, and Edgar Womble of the North Carolina Fossil Club was engaged in a similar pursuit of invertebrate fossils. Mr. Harmatuk later opened his home to fossil collectors to view his specimens. With the assistance of the phosphate quarry, local government and civic organizations, and interested

citizens, the museum opened its doors in May, 1978 with a collection of fossils donated by Mr. Harmatuk and Mr. Womble.

The museum has its own fossil collecting area, called the 'Pit of the Pungo', across the street from the museum, next to the parking lot. It is an almost unlimited source of Miocene-age fossils donated by the PCS mine. In these fossil-rich soils, you can find the remains of extinct sharks, whales, bony fish, corals, and shells. We found two small sand tiger shark teeth, a couple of unidentified bone fragments, and dozens of pieces of fossil coral in about 15 minutes of collecting there. The museum staff normally will provide assistance in identifying your finds, but it was raining pretty hard while we were there, so we were on our own.

Unfortunately, we had to return to Denver before their annual Fossil Festival, which was held on May 25-27. This is a pretty big deal for such a small town (population: 520 in 2010). It includes fossil and mineral dealers, food vendors, carnival rides, a car show, lectures, a parade, a tour of the PCS phosphate quarry, live music, and an auction.

The museum is open Monday through Saturday, 9 am until 4:30 pm. From March 1st through Labor Day, the museum is also open on Sunday from 12:30 to 4:30pm. The **Pit of the Pungo** is open for collecting from sun-up to sun-down every day. Admission to the museum is free but donations are gladly accepted. Ample free parking is provided.
