January Speaker

The talk at our January general meeting which will take place on Friday, January 7 will be given by Dr. Markus Raschke, who recently took a job with the University of Colorado at Boulder as a professor of Physics and Chemistry. He joined CMS this summer and got introduced to Colorado mineral collecting on the CMS field trip to Mt. Antero. The title of his talk is:

"The Geology and Exotic Minerals of the North Cascades in Washington State".

Dr. Raschke came to Colorado in summer 2010 from Seattle having previously studied and held positions in Bayreuth, Rutgers, Munich, Berkeley and Berlin. He and his students use laser spectroscopy to study extremely tiny crystals of metals and metal oxides with distinctive properties. Some, for example, behave as optical antennas, others as magnets, and yet others, depending on their temperature, as electrical insulators or conductors. To study these nano-crystals, which are smaller than 1/10,000th of the diameter of a human hair, Markus and his students have developed new microscopy techniques. Their goal is to understand the fundamental mechanisms by which light interacts with these new nano-materials and thence the physical origin of their properties. This enables the group to optimize materials for the development of faster optical communication, more specific optical medical-diagnostics devices, or new kinds of solar cells.

As a diversion from his scientific work, Markus has developed a passion for geology. While living in the Pacific Northwest, he ventured into remote regions of the North Cascades in search of rare minerals. His favorite area the past two summers was the Golden Horn Batholith in the North Cascades. This alkaline-granite formation contains an unusual suite of chemical elements (lithium and rare earth) and that led to the formation of several very exotic minerals. In his presentation Markus will show many of these minerals, introduce you into the geology of the region, and share his collection adventures.




Congratulations to all our lucky winners, Eva and the young member who patiently helped draw the winning tickets. Unfortunately I did not get his name.


